WHEN BLINCO, a boutique housing development with a masterfully united industrial and historic vibe, captured the hearts of voters in last year's Building Designers Association of WA awards, it was nothing more than plans on paper.


Less than a year after netting the People's Choice Award, the project - which was designed by Dalecki Design and built by Kre8 Constructions WA - has come to fruition. The result is as spectacular as everyone dared imagine it could be.

The development is home to four luxury, doublestorey houses all with energy ratings above seven stars. Its edgy modern industrial design epitomises the features of the older warehouses found throughout Fremantle.

The three-bedroom homes, carefully designed to harmonise with one another, still have their unique differences. Each has a functional layout with lots of amenity and a superb collection of materials.

Part of their charm comes from the location, positioned a short walk from Monument Hill and Booyeembara Park and the cafes and bars on George Street.

Dalecki Design was briefed to design four houses to sit comfortably within the historic local context whilst still clearly displaying a point of difference by utilising modern, sustainable yet cost-effective materials.

All four houses are exposed to the northern aspect with a strong focus on indoor-outdoor connection.

While the four houses are unique, with each designed to maximise the potential of the individual site, there are significant similarities, which helped to keep construction costs down.

Attention to detail in the interior design of the bathrooms pays dividends. We love the black accessories.









The houses all feature a mixed material palette including exposed brickwork, vertical cladding and exposed concrete.

The exposed concrete makes an appearance on floors, on some ceilings, in wet areas and on the external facade.

Greenery has been cleverly incorporated into the design of the front elevations to soften the appearance of the hard, raw materials.

The overall design has a clean modern aesthetic with feature curves paying homage to the historical architecture of Fremantle.
